Tackling gender norms and gender-based violence through women's sports in rural Kenya, Principal Investigator, 2018 - ongoing

- Empirical study of the effects of an adult women's soccer league on male and female attitudes towards women's roles in thirteen villages in southeastern rural Kenya

Love in the time of COVID-19: Economic shocks and household dynamics in Botswana, 2020 – ongoing

- Examine the extent to which households in Maun, Botswana, have experienced economic shocks directly related to COVID-19, including loss of formal or informal employment, loss of income due to furloughs or reductions in wages, loss of access to informal markets, and/or loss of health insurance.
- Identify COVID-19-related changes in the level of unpaid household care and the distribution of responsibilities among male and female household members.
- Explore the ways in which changes in the relative percentage of economic resources provided by males and females in the household have affected couple dynamics.
- Examine the extent to which economic shocks due to COVID-19 experienced by households have altered the nature and extent of intimate partner violence.
